

# Open Day at the Farm at Galong

On Saturday 18th of November, five members of the Executive and Council of Catholic Women's League Sydney Archdiocese attended the open day at the Farm at Galong which is a facility focussed on rehabilitation for women and children coming down from drug and alcohol abuse and provides counselling for those suffering domestic violence, with a view to reuniting families.

The Farm has been our Project of the Year for two years now and has been a most rewarding experience.

We were made most welcome and enjoyed morning tea and lunch with other guests, board members and some of the residents who gave amazing and courageous testimonials describing their journey through the Farm program.

They have a very strict daily routine commencing at 7 a.m. in the Chapel and progressing through time set aside for the animals, cleaning, cooking and counselling etc. It sounded like a long day!

The Farm, in the past, has been an aged care facility and a boarding school which is being restored and refurbished; it's first intake of clients was in 2019. It is a beautiful old building surrounded by 3 hectares of farmland and gardens.

Kate Cleary who runs the Farm, is very grateful for any assistance we have been able to give her. Apart from donations,



each year for Christmas we put together a Pamper Pack for each resident, which we delivered during our visit. There were twenty residents last year and eight this year. Speaking with Kate, she thought that eight was a more manageable number.

The very sad news was that the Mum had relapsed and so the Mum and Baby we had been looking forward to meeting were not there. Kate felt it likely, and we can only hope, that her mothering instincts will win through and she will seek help for them both.

After our visit we were all really impressed with the whole enterprise and would like to maintain contact with the Farm into the future.

#### ANGELA DIZON Social Work

Australian Catholic University - Strathfield Campus

Angela completed her schooling at Brigidine College, St Ives, and is currently undertaking a bachelor's degree in Social Work. She is a first generation Australian, born to Filipino parents who migrated to Sydney 25 years ago. She has attended Holy Spirit Parish for her whole life. As an only child of Asian descent, she was confronted early in life with the idea that she was 'different' from her peers. Although this brought about challenges, she feels her identity has afforded her experiences and a worldview that have provided insight into the existence and role of privilege within societal structures. From a young age, she reflected on her own privileges, which prompted her to explore how particular groups and communities are oppressed and experience significant disadvantages. As her understanding deepened, so too did her desire to support marginalised people by challenging

Angela always knew that she wanted a career working with people. Completing high school, she was unsure of which pathway she would take to achieve her goals. She began with enrolment in a Primary Teaching degree at Macquarie University. To this she added practical experience working with West Ryde Before and After School Care and Hireup, Disability and Aged Care Support Work. She also achieved qualifications in First Aid and Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation. Though rewarding, Angela felt that her passion for equity, human rights, and social justice would be better addressed by changing directions.

Currently as a 3rd year Social Work student, she has commenced her first placement and persevered through hardships involving personal illness (generalised anxiety disorder and OCD). While these hardships have posed their own respective challenges, Angela feels her personal experiences will make her a better practitioner. Angela sees the profession as providing her an opportunity to advocate alongside marginalised groups for positive change. She believes her identity as an emerging and professional social worker will forever be rooted in critical reflection and a love of learning.

Angela is proud of what she has accomplished and excited for what she will achieve in the future. Receiving this award is a meaningful affirmation of her effort and resilience and, additionally, will support her to focus and make the most of her placements.

#### **WORLD DAY OF PRAYER**

Celebrated on the First Friday in March Every Year

The World Day of Prayer is a global ecumenical movement, led by Christian women from around the world, who call people of all cultures and languages, to observe a special day of prayer, on one particular day each year.

Its origins date back to the 19<sup>th</sup> century when Christian women in the United States of America and Canada, began organising interdenominational structures to effectively help women at home and in the foreign missions. After World War 1, they were convinced that world peace was intrinsically tied to unity and prayer and this led to the development of a worldwide movement.

On a particular day each year, Christian women, from many different cultures and traditions, call the faithful together to meet and pray at a common service, with a special annual theme.

Every four years, the Ecumenical World Day of Prayer Committee, consisting of representatives from Africa, Asia, North America, Latin America, the Caribbean, Middle East and the Pacific meet. These women from Catholic. Protestant and Orthodox traditions, pray together, and select venues, writers and themes for a common service, beginning as the sun rises in Samoa and creating, what I have heard described, as a tidal wave of prayer, which washes around the world on that one particular day.

More than 170 countries participate in the celebration. People of various

races, cultures and traditions share in God's Word and worship, using the same order of service, which has been translated into more than 60 languages and 1,000 dialects.

Through the World Day of Prayer, Christians around the world affirm their faith and share their hopes, fears, joys, sorrows and opportunities. Everyone is encouraged become aware of the burdens of other people, to pray for them, and help them to know, that they no longer live in isolation.

In 2019, the World Day of Prayer Committee met in Brazil and selected Palestine as the venue for 2024. An ecumenical group of Palestinian Christian women prayed, reflected together and wrote the service with the theme,"I Beg You - Bear With One Another in Love" based on Ephesians 4:1-7. When the distressing conflict in Palestine arose, they firmly believed that there should be no sides. They invited the world to pray, that humanity and compassion would transcend religious or political affiliations.

On the World Day of Prayer on Friday 1<sup>st</sup> March, we joined Christians in Palestine and around the world, to pray that the welfare and dignity of every individual irrespective of nationality, religion or origin was respected and that there would be peace and justice for all.
