President's Report

We concluded 2022 with our Annual General Meeting held on 8th November. Our new Constitution had been circulated to all members and notice had been given of a Motion to be put at the AGM adopting that Constitution. We had a good attendance and in addition, many members forwarded their proxy vote instructions. The Constitution was adopted by a large majority of members. Also at the AGM Council members were elected and we welcomed Jean Burns from Summer Hill Branch as a new Councillor.

Our Project of the Year is The Farm at Galong, a rehabilitation centre for women that aims to assist in overcoming substance abuse and other anti-social behaviour by re-introducing participants to the workforce through various educational and motivational programs. To date we have donated \$5,000.00 to this project. Also, just before Christmas we presented the Centre CEO, Kate Cleary, with twenty Christmas pamper packs that for some residents was the only Christmas present received.

On 23rd January, Tex Quirk, Jay Turner and I attended the National Council of Women of NSW Inc Australia Day awards presentation at University of Technology, Sydney. We had sponsored Mariatu Tholley, a refugee from Sierra Leone, with a grant of \$1,000.00. Mariatu survived a brutal civil war in her home country before escaping and spending some time in a refugee camp and subsequently migrating with her parents and six siblings who now call Australia home. By hard work and dedication Mariatu has educated herself and is now in her 3rd year of a Bachelor of Social Work at the Australian Catholic University.

Other donations made during the year included a secondary school scholarship of \$20,000.00 over 2 years (2022 and 2023),

\$1,000.00 to the Tongan Appeal, \$1,000.00 to CWL Lismore for the flood victims, \$500,00 to St Charles Parish Ryde for a Vinnies Van, and \$500.00 to Kara Minds to assist with their ongoing research into dementia.

On 7th February we held our first Council meeting for 2023 with all Councillors showing renewed vigour and plans for this year.

Our opening Mass was held on 14th February and celebrated by our Chaplain Fr. Greg Morgan. We were delighted to welcome 48 members, our largest gathering since before COVID. No doubt our guest speaker, Leila Abdallah, was a great draw card. She is an inspirational speaker and a truly committed catholic, and we were very privileged to hear her story of despair and forgiveness.

Fr Greg's Homily

Saints Cyril and Methodius were two brothers and bishops of the ninth century. They were Greek by birth but were sent as missionaries to what we might broadly refer to as "Eastern Europe". Hence, St Pope John Paull II referred to them as the "Apostles to the Slavs".

They were by no means the first missionaries to go to that part of the world. But they were the first to truly evangelise it. And they were sent there because Prince Rostislav, who was one of the rulers of that region at the time, declared that the only way his people were going to convert is if someone could make the faith intelligible: "Many Christian teachers have reached us from Italy, from Greece and from Germany, who instruct us in different ways. But we Slavs ... have no one to direct us towards the truth and instruct us in an understandable way".

Saints and Methodius Cyril are remembered for making the faith understandable by translating scriptures and the liturgy from Greek into Slavonic; even designing a new alphabet known as Cyrillic. Of course, this certainly made the faith understandable at a superficial level. But their real genius was that they knew that evangelisation is not simply a matter of translating texts. Far more importantly, one must gain access to the "interior world" of the culture they are wanting to convert.

This is a difficult thing to do - to try to see the world through the unique history and experience of the people you are wanting to talk to. But once you do this, you begin to develop concepts/metaphors/and

images that bring the faith alive by making it understandable; even if it remains a source of inexhaustible mystery.

Throughout history, the Church has often been gravely misunderstood. In the early Church, Catholic-Christians were persecuted by the Roman Empire because they were thought to be advocating cannibalism; declaring to eat the flesh and drink the blood of Christ. The seemingly innocuous "sign of peace" - also known as the "kiss of peace" - and the fact that Christians called each other "brother and sister in Christ" led them also to be accused of advocating incestuous relationships. Protestantism largely out of a misunderstanding of the papacy and even now misunderstands what Catholics believe about Our Lady.

Even one of my elderly parishioners told

me about her cousin, Fr Francis Douglas, who could one day become a Saint for being martyred on account of a great misunderstanding about confession. Fr Douglas was born in New Zealand but soon after his ordination he was sent as a missionary to run a Parish in the Philippines during the Second World War. In 1943, American guerrilla forces were beginning to push back the Japanese occupants. Hearing of a Catholic priest in the area, the Americans invited Fr Vernon to hear their confessions.

A Japanese soldier witnessed Fr Vernon in the jungle meeting privately with a number of the Americans and quickly came to the conclusion that Fr Vernon was not a priest but a spy. On returning to his parish, he was abducted by Japanese soldiers and taken to another parish church which was being used to hold 250 prisoners and to torture them. He was tied to the baptismal font, brutally tortured whilst they interrogated him: "What did the Americans tell you?" His only response was: "You have no right to ask me that question, and I cannot, in conscience, answer it'." Eventually he died from the extreme torture in defence of the seal of confession.

All this said, we should take great consolation that Christ, Himself, God-Incarnate, was readily misunderstood by many. He did His best to make His teaching accessible through a creative use of imagery and parables; but, nevertheless, He too was executed.

Today's Feast of Cyril and Methodius invites you as members of the CWL to

apprehend two important points as we begin this new year of outreach:

- 1) being misunderstood as Catholics by the broader culture is part and parcel of the Church's history. It can be frustrating at times; it can be irksome; but it is somewhat inevitable. The question is, what are we doing to counteract this "misunderstanding".
- (2) One of the most misunderstood dimensions of the Church's life/teaching is its approach to women. A hot topic. CWL should have a significant and serious role about promoting what women do in the life of the Church and begin a centre of formation for women to discern their vocations to be saints.

As Cyril and Methodius demonstrated, it is not enough just to use contemporary words. We have to understand what is going on — it all begins with a solid diagnosis. I encourage you to reflect on how you (and I) can become more effective and attractive on this score. What did we do last year that was different and was it successful? If we haven't changed anything then we're likely not evangelising the culture.

The human voice is a powerful thing. It can be used to do incredible good and incredible evil. But the very best thing we can do with our voice is to speak the truths of faith with apostolic fervour and integrity. The CWL must always rediscover that power and use its voice to bring women closer to God.

Update from Thanh Tâm Special School, Đà Nẵng

Explore and experiment with new beneficial crops to expand their vegetable repertoire.
