

FR GREG'S REFLECTION

Fr Greg Morgan's Homily from the Opening Mass held Tuesday February 9th 2021



"It is when we all play safe that we create a world of insecurity." "It is when we all play safe that we create a world of insecurity."

It is very tempting, particularly in an age of covid constraints, ongoing religious hostility, and technological distraction, to choose to 'play our Catholicism safe'. What do I mean?

To 'play our Catholicism safe' is to reduce our call holiness to little more than a nice, pious ideal; rather than to dare to believe & discover it is my true destiny.

To 'play our Catholicism safe' is to write-off Christ's moral teachings as too hard and too outdated; rather than to dare to believe & discover that they are the source of my true joy.

To 'play our Catholicism safe' is to excuse myself from the sacrament of penance; rather than to dare to believe & discover it is the means to experiencing true mercy.

To 'play our Catholicism safe' is to speak about the genius of Christ solely from within the confines of Churches, or within bureaucratic-

like safe-spaces, or from behind the existential shield of one's desk; rather than to dare to believe and discover that there is no greater use of one's voice; no greater use of one's talents; and no greater use of one's life than to proclaim and defend that genius – lovingly, boldly, yet always unashamedly – in a world that is crippled by self-doubt, indecision, and spiritual asininity.

Today's readings, perhaps providentially, implore you and I not to give into that temptation to safety and, thus, insecurity. To not dimmish our Catholicism to mere 'lip-service' or to a cacophony of 'human traditions'. No! Our Catholicism has to be intrinsic to our identity; it has to permeate the way we live; and define who we are above all else.

In other words, a strong – robustly Catholic – identity is the antidote to insecurity

So, as you, the venerable leaders and members of the CWL, gather for the first time in this new year of grace, 2021, this new beginning, I pray that you will never lose sight of your identity; that you will never allow this organisation to give way to insecurity; but, instead, you will be inspired by your history; animated by your faith; emboldened by its genius; and feel proud to be Catholic women, who love Christ & His Church with their hearts as well as with their lips.

The Catholic Women's League has incredible potential to be a powerful source of social, cultural, and ecclesiastical change — precisely because it has the potential to define its identity in the powerful virtues of faith, hope, and love. Always clothed in even deeper prayer and nourished by Truth.

So, I say to you today: know who you are! Or, run the risk of being yet another insecure and inane organisation in an already insecure and, at times, inane Church.

You are not the Tea-Making League. You are not the Knitting League. You are not the Crochet League. You are not the Candlemakers League. You are the Catholic Women's League.

And, perhaps more than ever before, the Church in Australia and beyond, needs your voice; she needs your energy; she needs your



conviction. Because the genius of Catholicism is hopelessly incomplete if the genius of women and womanhood is not rejoiced, respected, and revered. For, as the first reading makes clear, "God created man in the image of himself, in the image of God he created him, male and female he created them." Both male and female mirror and complement each other in the mystery of the Imago Dei.

Of course, what I am saying is by no means original. In his letter to Catholic women in 1995, St John Paul II said: "Thank you, every woman, for the simple fact of being a woman! Through the insight which is so much a part of your womanhood you enrich the world's understanding and help to make human relations more honest and authentic."

But then he added: "I know of course that simply saying thank you is not enough."

In other words, lip-service about the role of women in the Church is not enough. Your "insight" can help keep the Church "more honest and authentic". And I firmly believe this is true, particularly in a post-Royal Commission age.

However, none of this should come at the expense of our Catholic tradition. In fact, as firmly as I believe the voice of women is essential for our future, so I believe that it is by rediscovering Catholic orthodoxy and, so, a genuinely Catholic identity as women that your voices will be more powerful; more palpable; more potent! And, by being honestly and authentically Catholic, you will remind priests and bishops, and all the faithful of their call to be authentic and honest as well.

Catholicism is not a religion of lip-service. It is a faith built upon risk-taking.

If you and I (and the Catholic Women's League) are not prepared to take risks for our faith, then we will die a slow death to irrelevance and obsolescence. But if you and I (and the Catholic Women's League) allow Christ to overcome our fears and our insecurities, our doubts and our worries, our gripes and our grievances, in order to be open to risk-taking and grace-filled change, then do not be surprised if the world begins to take a second look at Christ and his true Church; do not be surprised if thousands of Catholic women take a second look at the Catholic Women's League. For no one is attracted by insecurity; no one is attracted by a constant rhetoric of being in decline; but everyone is attracted by unwavering fidelity and a truly Catholic conviction.



Blessed Carlo Acutis (3 May 1991 – 12 October 2006)

"Sadness is looking at oneself, happiness is looking at God. Conversion is nothing but a movement of the eyes".

Amateur computer programmer, video game enthusiast and a devotee of the Eucharist – Blessed Carlo Acutis the millennial saint.

Carlo was an English born Italian who at the young age of 11, began to investigate the Eucharistic miracles that have occurred in history. Using his computer knowledge, he created a website that outlined all of these miracles he so loved to research before his death due to leukemia. He was noted for his cheerfulness, computer skills, and deep devotion to the Eucharist, which became a core theme of his life. He was beatified on 10 October 2020. Carlo could not understand why stadiums were full of people and churches were empty. He would repeatedly say, "They have to see, they have to understand." He admired Giacomo Alberione's initiatives to use the media to evangelize and proclaim the Gospel and aimed to do likewise with the website he had created. It was on the website that he said: "The more Eucharist we receive, the more we will become like Jesus, so that on this earth we will have a foretaste of heaven".

In 1995, when Acutis was four years old, his maternal grandfather died and was said to have appeared to him in a dream asking to be prayed for. Three years later he requested to receive his First Communion at the early age of seven. Acutis became a frequent communicant and would make a weekly confession.

When he developed leukemia, he offered his suffering saying: "I offer all the suffering I will have to undergo for the Lord, for the Pope, and the Church". He had asked his parents to take him on pilgrimages to the sites of all the known Eucharistic miracles

in the world, but his declining health prevented this from happening. The doctors treating his final illness had asked him if he was in great pain to which he responded that "there are people who suffer much more than me". He died on 12 October 2006 at 6:45 AM from M3 fulminant leukemia. He was buried in Assisi in accordance with his wishes.

Acutis's mother, Antonia, is said to attribute to his intercession the fact that, at the age of 44, she gave birth to twins, born exactly four years to the day after his death. Following the Catholic Church's recognition of a miracle in 2020, attributed to Acutis, Antonia told the press that her son had appeared to her in dreams saying that he will not only be beatified but also canonised a Saint in the future.

The call for him to be beatified began not long after Acutis' death. On 14 November 2019, the Vatican's Medical Council of the Congregation for the Causes of Saints expressed a positive opinion about a miracle in Brazil attributed to Acutis' intercession. Luciana Vianna had taken her son, Mattheus, who was born with a pancreatic defect which made eating difficult, to a prayer service. Beforehand, Vianna had already prayed a novena asking for the teenager Acutis' intercession. During the service her son had simply asked that he should not "throw up as much". Immediately following the service, Mattheus told his mother he felt healed and asked for solid food when he came home. Until then he had been on an all-liquid diet. After a detailed investigation, Pope Francis confirmed the miracle's authenticity in a decree on 21 February 2020, leading to Acutis' beatification.

10 October 2020 the beatification Mass was held in the Upper Church of the Basilica of Saint Francis of Assisi in Assisi, Italy, with Cardinal Agostino Vallini presiding on the Pope's behalf.

ST PATRICK'S DAY FUNDRAISER PROJECT

For our St Patrick's Day branch gathering, we will be raising funds for those affected by Cyclone Yasa in Fiji.

The island of Vanua Levu bore the brunt of Category 5 Tropical Cyclone Yasa when it hit Fiji on 17th December 2020 leaving at least four people dead and one missing. Entire villages have been crushed and thousands of people are now homeless after what is one of the strongest storms ever recorded.

Tropical Cyclone Yasa has affected an estimated 93,000 people. 36 evacuation centres remain open to accommodate 928 displaced people. Humanitarian response is ongoing with the distribution of food rations, non-food items, and hygiene supplies.

On 30 January, Tropical Cyclone Ana followed a similar path as Tropical Cyclone Yasa but made landfall westwards over the main island of Viti Levu. Tropical Cyclone Ana arrived in Fiji waters as a Category 2 cyclone but brought a lot of rain causing widespread flooding across the Central, Western and Northern Divisions. Impacts of Ana have been felt across the whole country. Worst impacted are the communities in the provinces of Macuata and Cakaudrove that were still recovering from Yasa.

As of 2 February, Fiji National Disaster Management Office reported 14,755 evacuees in 422 evacuation centres across the country. Extensive flooding caused damage to infrastructure with 131 roads and crossings temporarily closed. All major roads in Vanua Levu remained closed cutting off supply of food and relief items to affected areas.

There have been two confirmed fatalities and three people reported missing. The main concerns are increased risk of leptospirosis, typhoid, dengue and diarrhoea due to poor water access and standing water. Hygiene is a concern due to the lack of access to clean water. Early recovery efforts for livelihoods, fixing shelters and access to food and water are all required.
